In all, the Class of 2018 earned over \$15 million in grants and scholarships, with over \$883,000 in local community support. Some of those educational institutions throughout the United States include (but are not limited to): Dartmouth, M.I.T. American, Boston, Clemson, Colgate, Georgia State, Indiana, James Madison, Lafayette College, Michigan State, Louisiana State, Tulane, Villanova, Muhlenberg College, NYU, Oberlin College of Arts and Science, Penn State, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Rochester Institute of Technology, San Diego State, The Universities of Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Delaware, Maryland, Miami, Tampa, Texas, Vermont, Wisconsin, Wyoming and West Point Military Academy. Staying closer to home, students will be attending (but not limited to): Brookdale, Montclair, Monmouth University,The College of New Jersey, Rutgers, Rider and the New Jersey Institute of Technology.



Salutatorian, Lauren Marcolus, a VPA dance major who will study at NYU next year, talked of the bright future that lies ahead.

She stated, "These caps and gowns mark a transition into a life filled with new people and opportunities, but also one with new responsibilities and challenges--a life we have the power to



make into something remarkable, but one we must confront the unknown to create...

Now is our time to explore that unknown-- our time to travel, create, connect, to take every opportunity to try things, things that scare us, and to learn and grow from both our successes and, more importantly, our failures."

Salutatorian Hannah Gazdus, a studio art major RBR, will study mechanical and/or materials engineering and pursue

a concentration in creative writing. She evoked the foundation that her fellow students will build upon. She told the audience that she had transferred from a magnet school to her district high school and came to realize all the opportunities RBR had to offer.

She explained, "The less-than-ideal school experiences before I came here have made me appreciate

RBR even more. We tend to take things for granted, but RBR is truly a remarkable place. My experience in searching for the right



school has shown me that no other high school in the area boasts the academic rigor, passionate faculty, and diversity of student body that RBR does,"

She added, "We may depart from RBR today, but we can't deny its existence on our paths in life. Remove RBR, and the path breaks. Our paths have led to RBR and will depart in so many

unanticipated directions. Look behind on the road and you may see a moment, a waypoint, or a guide. Don't forget these years. Appreciate how far you've come and how far you have yet to go.





RBR's friend and colleague, Julius Clark, will be our new principal and should take up his responsibilities by September 1, 2019. He replaces Risa Clay, who is retiring and officially leaves the district in October. Mrs. Clay was on medical leave for the 2018-19 school year.

Julius Clark began his educational career in the Red Bank Borough Public School District as a math teacher just after graduating from the College of New Jersey in



2005. Mr. Clark was named Red Bank's 2014 Teacher of Year and received the New Jersey Governor's Teacher Recognition Award. He also served as a head basketball and head soccer coach while at Red Bank. Mr. Clark obtained his Master of Science in Educational Leadership from Fairleigh Dickinson

University in 2012 followed by his principal certification in 2013. Mr. Clark left Red Bank this past school year to take an assistant principal position for the West Windsor-Plainsboro School District.

He states of his new role at RBR, "I am thrilled to be back in this community which is near and dear to my heart. I intend to focus on educating the whole child so that students are prepared for an ever changing global society and continue to encourage teachers to create a positive, welcoming classroom environment that challenges students to be their best self."

Building Project Update

The Board continues to meet with the architect to finalize the building drawings. A decision has been made to use a masonry exterior versus steel. Every attempt to bring more light into the media center is a priority and is being explored. A decision has been made for the infill on the artificial field, a concern for our community. We will use a new type of rubber infill that addresses the health concerns of the old materials but maintains all the benefits. It is used on professional fields including, most recently, the University of Notre Dame.

Our original timeline is still on track. We will soon be participating with the Monmouth County Improvement Authority for the sale of bonds utilizing their AAA rating. This should give our taxpayers an estimated savings of over \$800,000 over the life of the bonds. We intend to break ground in late fall with an anticipated completion date of late 2020.

Matt has competed in the national Cyberpatriot competitions, leading a team one year and contributing to this year's second place championship for the State of New Jersey. high school, she maintained her studies with a tutor and flourished academically when she returned to RBR. She is also a 2018 AP Scholar Award winner excelling in her many AP classes. She won the Academic Varsity Letter in her junior year where she maintained the high honor roll every semester that year. She was appointed a student to student peer leader and was awarded the Society of Women Engineering Certificate of Merit. She has played soccer for RBR all four years of high school. Julia still keeps her hand in skiing, as a competitive freestyle ski coach to 8 to 13 year olds, traveling to upstate New York every weekend during the winter months. A highlight of that job brought her to Colorado this April where she coached in the national competition. Julia accepted a generous scholarship to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute where she will study in a rare five-year architectural program, which grants an architecture certification upon its completion. She was delighted to have the opportunity to attend the Engineering Academy stating, "Engineering allowed to me to see what opportunities I had in the field."

CLAIRE TAYLOR of Ocean, a vocal major in RBR's VPA program has amassed many accolades for her amazing talents since attending high school. Most recently, she was awarded the 2019 All Shore Chorus Vocal Performance Scholarship. Claire is a student leader who spearheaded the March 15, 2018 National School Walkout Day at RBR in memory and in solidarity with the Parkland, Fl., high school students who experienced the worst school massacre in US history. Over 500 RBR students joined her on the high school track to walk for 17 minutes in tribute to the victims and to advocate for sensible gun safety legislation.

This past year, she earned very distinctive awards in both the Young Hero Award from American Legion Auxiliary for New Jersey as well as the Medal of Honor from the Girl Scouts. Both were awarded for her heroic actions taken last year in performing CPR, which saved her younger sister's life. Claire explained to the press that she learned CPR while obtaining her babysitting certification.

She stated, "It's definitely worthwhile to have some sort of emergency response background. When the moment does arrive, if it does, you can focus on taking action with what you already know."

Claire will be attending the prestigious Hartt School of Music at the University of Hartford and intends to pursue a career in vocal performance.

KA'SHAUN TURNER of Red Bank has been playing football since he was six years old. He ventured into basketball when he was in middle school but found his



way back to his first love in eighth grade. He joined RBR's football team as a defensive tackle and soon distinguished himself as a BUC football star. Ka'shaun's dedication to his sport was on full display as he worked out four days a week and practiced every day. His junior year football experience was a bit

disappointing as RBR only won two games, but he significantly contributed to the great comeback this year, when RBR qualified for its first playoff game since 2015 with a 7 and 3 record. Ka'shaun earned 9 sacks in his junior year and 10 in his senior for a total 19 career sacks. His football accolades include the All Division and All Shore first team; he will participate in the Summer All-Shore Football Classic. Ka'shaun was recently awarded the Vince Lombardi Award for his football performance. He has been an active member of the District's Student Advisory Council to the Superintendent during his junior and senior year. Ka'shuan is very excited to be playing football next year at East Stroudsberg University where he will study criminal justice.

GIRLS' LACROSSE




