Helping Your Child Choose a Career Path

- Have discussions on their academic interests, extracurricular interests, and work environments.
- Have conversations on different career skills to see what piques their interest.
- Introduce different careers through family members and friends.
- Begin to research careers and compile a list of potential careers.
- Counselors will be working with all juniors to complete career surveys to help match strengths and personality types with careers. (YouScience in Scoir)

The College Search

- Consider/prioritize the most important factors for the student
 - Location & campus setting
 - Undergraduate enrollment size
 - Major of interest
 - Cost
 - Student success measurements/ <u>Return on Investment</u>
 (graduation/retention/job placement)
 - Special program consideration or needs

FACTORS COLLEGES WILL BE LOOKING AT

- The rigor of courses/course requirements for some majors.
- Performance in these classes; 6 semester transcript.
- GPA (recalculated).
- Standardized test scores (many test optional schools, Fall 2024 still pending)
- Activities (job, club, sports, leadership role, tutoring, volunteering internships, etc.).
- Personal Essay and some colleges have Supplemental Questions/Essays.
- Recommendations from 2 teachers and School Counselor.
- Some colleges will look at supplemental materials (music, videos, outside recommendations).
- Some colleges look at demonstrated interest.
- Each college weighs each of these differently.

- SATs vs ACTs
 - Many Colleges are Test Optional or Test Flexible (<u>www.fairtest.org</u>)
- TOEFL Tests
- AP Tests
- IB Tests

DEVELOP A TESTING TIMELINE

- Plan to take the test 2-3 times if possible.
- Consider your math level when developing a testing timeline
- Remember to consider events like AP/IB Tests, Prom, and vacations and where you best test (RBRHS vs. another school).
 - The earlier you sign up, the more options for testing centers especially if approved for accommodations by the SATs or ACTs*.



College Timeline & Checklist - Junior Year

The Fall (September – November)

- Take the PSAT exam and review your scores
- Organize your testing strategy for the SAT or ACT and register for an exam *Either later this winter or sometime in the spring
- Junior year grades will say a lot about your academic performance; Study Hard!

The Winter (December – March)

- ☐ Login to SCOIR and Identify possible college matches by completing a search
- ☐ Study for the SAT or ACT and practice (Khan academy, test prep preview)
- ☐ Construct a strong senior year schedule with rigorous courses
- ☐ Create a "top 10" priority list of your wants and needs in a college
- ☐ Create a document or log to organize all of your college information notes.

College Timeline & Checklist - Junior Year

The Spring (March – May)

- ☐ Take the <u>SAT</u> or <u>ACT</u> at least once before the end of the school year. Register at their websites.
- Explore colleges online; take a deeper look by region, size, academic reputation and cost
- ☐ Educate yourself on admission requirements to colleges you are considering
- ☐ Visit different colleges and demonstrate interest by connecting with admission representatives
- ☐ Continue searching for college matches and start creating a list of colleges in Scoir
- ☐ Students will begin the common application in the Spring with Guidance, supplemental essays become available on 08/01
- ☐ Identify and ask a couple teachers to write letters of recommendation on your behalf

The Summer (June – August)

- ☐ Complete the Brag Sheet for your school counselor
- ☐ Complete Teacher Recommendation Forms
- Practice makes perfect; begin working on your college application essay. RBRHS offers an essay writing workshop over the summer.
- ☐ Continue visiting college campuses and demonstrating interest.
- ☐ Continue searching for college matches and adding to your list of colleges in Scoir
- Get a summer job or valuable academic experience to help prepare for college
- ☐ Start completing applications and essay(s).


