In this country, the new year celebration is referred to as Tet. Families assemble five-fruit trays to honor ancestors and bring prosperity in the new year. Traditions vary, with distinct cultural practices in the northern and southern regions of the country.





This country celebrates the new year in three stages, which last a combined total of 15 days. Popular decorations include red paper lanterns, inscribed with phrases like "arriving luck."








This country is home to a decently large population of Chinese expats and families of Chinese descent, so it celebrates the new year with many typical Chinese traditions. Here, round shapes are thought to bring good luck, so Media Noche, the customary midnight meal, features 12 round fruits, and folks wear polka dot-patterned clothes for Lunar New Year.







Monster legend inspires New Year traditions

most East Asian calendars are derived from the lunisolar Chinese calendar. (For reference, the Gregorian calendar — the standard calendar most of the world uses to mark time — is strictly solar.)

According to the traditional Chinese calendar, the new year begins on the second new moon after the winter solstice (typically, Dec. 21 or 22). In China, the New Year's celebration lasts for 15 days. Also known since the early 1900s as the Spring Festival, Chinese workers are typically granted seven consecutive days off from work to welcome the oncoming spring season — though this year, the Chinese government extended the holiday to eight days.

The holiday's origin is deeply rooted in Chinese legends, the most popular of which is the legend of the Nian beast. There are many variations of the Nian legend, but







Unlike the Western zodiac, which is based on Ancient Greek and Babylonian astrology and tied to birth date, the Chinese zodiac is interpreted according to year of birth. 2025, which begins today in Chinese and other Asian cultures, is the year of the snake.

STEP 1: animal

These can vary by culture, but there are traditionally 12 creatures associated with Asian zodiacs. It is thought that each animal lends its traits to those born in the year associated with it.

STEP 2: element

The ancient Chinese concept of $w\check{u}x\acute{i}ng$, usually translated as Five Phases or Five Agents, explains many natural phenomena as a balance between five forces.

METAL	autumn, collecting, changing, contracting, dryness	Years ending 0-1
WATER	winter, retreat, stillness, consolidation, coolness	Years ending 2-3
WOOD	springtime, growth, vitality, movement, wind	Years ending 4-5
FIRE	summer, flowering, passion, intensity, heat	Years ending 6-7
EARTH	late summer, transition, leveling out, dampness	Years ending 8-9
